CV and Career Statement for Betty Brown M.A. P.P.R.U.A

Betty Brown was elected President of the Royal Ulster Academy in 2018 and completed a three-year term of office in June 2021. As Chairman of the RUA Trust she became acting Director of the organisation during a time of unprecedented social change due to the Covid-19 pandemic. As Chairman of the RUA Selection Committee and curator of the RUA Exhibitions 2018-2020 at the Ulster Museum, she led the RUA to expand its Open Selection part of the Annual Exhibition in 2018 and 2019. When the Covid-19 pandemic lockdown put the 139th Annual Exhibition in doubt, Betty commissioned a ground-breaking 3D Virtual Exhibition from Marshall Arts Media. This turned out to be prescient and the RUA has received wide ranging praise for the quality of the Virtual Exhibition and new integrated website which also provided an online sales facility. During Lockdown, this decision enabled schools to take part in Virtual tours which allowed the RUA education programme to continue when practical visits to the museum became impossible.

Betty currently holds a trustee position on the Board of the British Institution Fund which is based at the Royal Academy and selects a yearly art award to young British artists.

During 2019 she has been invited to exhibit in the RHA Annual Exhibition in Dublin and in the Boyle Arts Festival participating again in 2021. She has taken part in the Hamilton Gallery St Brigid's Exhibition which took place in Sligo and travelled to the Irish Embassy in London. Betty also contributes to the annual Yeats Poetry Exhibition organised by the Hamilton Gallery Sligo in 2018, 2019 and 2020 which was being held in the Museum of Literature in Dublin and had to be suspended in the first lockdown in March.
